Pastor's page:

"Teacher, which is the great commandment in the law?" Jesus said to him, "'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind.' This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets." Matthew 22:36-40

With the first commandment, we understand that all we say and do is because we love the Lord and want our life to reflect the image of Christ. The second commandment is a little harder to define. How do you love self? This can be answered in many different ways, but I think the quote "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." helps us understand one perspective.

From January until May 17, I suffered the pain of bone on bone in my right hip. On a score of 1 to 10, my pain measured a 20. While continuing to pastor my flock, I had a great support team. Some lent me medical equipment, and others called me daily or weekly to check on me. An occasional card would arrive on a day I needed it most. On Sunday, I was met the moment my car door opened. Loving people were right there to help me get inside the building and carry my things. Once inside I was met by people wanting to know how I felt and making sure everything was in the sanctuary to meet my needs, including a glass of water. One Sunday I had three glasses of water waiting for me. When prayer time came, the church family was reminded to keep me in prayer. Once back in the reception hall, my refreshments were brought to me, again sometimes by two or more people. Did I feel the love of God and my church? You bet I did!!!!!!

Your prayers carried me through the week before surgery when I could not take my usual pain pills. A church member came to sit with Paul and Sherry during surgery and was there to greet me when I got in my room from recovery. I had visits, cards and flowers. The lilacs not only blessed me but blessed every nurse that come in my room as they enjoyed that sweet lilac fragrance.

There were more cards and phone calls welcoming me home. Is it any wonder I wanted to go to church only ten days after surgery? My church family welcomed me home and it felt wonderful!! It was a great testimony of treating me the way you would want to be treated if surgery was on your agenda.

Sometimes we think those little things are so insignificant compared to what other Christians are doing in the world, but that small gesture of love on your part means the whole world to the recipient. Never underestimate the power of showing love in the little ways.

I also want to say thank you for allowing me to minister from the ground floor until I can return to the higher platform. Again it shows your compassion and understanding. I know that God is well pleased with your display of love for your pastor. I ask that He bless you as you have blessed me. It is a delight to serve you.

Thank you! A Letter from Your World Relief Officer

God is doing more than we can imagine.

Dear American Baptist Leaders,

The human imagination is pretty incredible. I visited Nicaragua last year and met Luisa (on this years' poster) and heard her dreams for her family. She is a farmer, and their lives have gotten harder as the rains come less frequently. When they do come, it's often in downpours, not in the gently falling rains that best nourish crops. Their life is hard, yet when she pictures their future, she imagines her children growing up, going to college, being professionals, and caring for the Earth.

The human imagination is also limited, bound by our finite human experience. Sometimes the suffering of the world outpaces our ability to imagine new life.

For many, 2017 was an apocalyptic year filled with unbelievable hurricanes, earthquakes, fires, floods and violence. You prayed, stood with, and gave to people and needs from next-door neighbors to global neighbors you may never meet. As I write this letter in early February 2018, you have given over \$2 million to help the hundreds of thousands of people impacted by Hurricanes Harvey, Irma and Maria and mudslides and fires in California. These generous gifts help people envision recovery and new life, strengthened by the assurance that God is working in, through, and beyond us.

The same Apostle Paul who said that God is able to "accomplish abundantly more than we can ask or imagine" (Ephesians 3:20) also put the work of building abundance squarely at our feet: "...always seek to do good to one another and to all" (1 Thessalonians 5:15).

Serving Others, Serving Jesus

Luisa knows the land. She has lived near El Panama. Nicaragua for most of her 34 years. She is teaching her two sons to know the land. Luisa also sees the land changing. Rising temperatures and shifting rainfall patterns make the hard work of farming even harder.

In 2015, Luisa joined a 5-year agricultural project through the Council of Protestant Churches of Nicaragua (CEPAD). With farmers like Luisa, CEPAD is working for holistic change.

On her 1.5 acres, Luisa has improved soil quality with manure and mulch. Dripirrigation techniques provide consistent water. Luisa has already increased her harvest, but she is more excited about the project's future potential.

Her first focus is seeds. Training in seed selection enabled her to plant quality seeds, which she preserved and catalogued for next season and is sharing with her neighbors.

Luisa's hopes stretch farther than next season, though. She hopes the added income will fund her sons' educations to become professionals. At the same time, she is teaching them the land is part of their future — they are responsible for protecting the spring on their property.

With support from CEPAD and One Great Hour of Sharing, Luisa is planting seeds that will bear abundant fruit for today, tomorrow, and years to come. With God's help, these seeds will bear far more than we imagine.



Sharing resources through One Great Hour of Sharing is an invitation to imagination!

Through our sharing, we get a taste of the generosity of God, who does "immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine." When we look at suffering in the world, we can become discouraged, unable to see past the difficulty. But when we think of the wonders God works, our imaginations go wild! Just imagine how God is bringing transformation! Look at the picture of Luisa Maria Lopez and imagine the impact of God at work through simple seedlings. Seedlings your gifts to One Great Hour of Sharing helped provide and that will offer nourishment and income. The theologian Gustavo Gutierrez described poverty as "death-dealing. More than We can Imagine: A Future of Abundance in Nicaragua

n any given afternoon three years ago, you were most likely to find Luis Alfredo Palacio lounging in a chair watching television. Like many other young men just entering into adulthood, Luis was unsure about the direction of his life. As a soon-to-be father, though, he knew he needed to find work that was meaningful and would help provide for his family. That is when Luis connected with One Great Hour of Sharing partner, CEPAD (the Council of Protestant Churches of Nicaragua). CEPAD works with Nicaraguan communities to improve agricultural techniques and address challenges of climate change and land degradation.

The project assists local farmers in developing techniques for planting, seed selection, irrigation, and soil protection. These

techniques multiply the yields and varieties of crops, providing additional food and income for families. For Luis, it was the opportunity to begin farming and have a way to provide for his family. On a small plot of land behind his home, Luis had the space to begin planting a small selection of crops. Within months, he literally began to see the "fruits" of his labor.

Through this new work, Luis discovered a passion-teaching. As an agricultural promoter, Luis is now teaching five other families how to improve their farming. He has developed a small demonstration plot behind his home to use in sharing techniques like soil curbing to prevent erosion, drip irrigation for water conservation, and using manure to improve soil quality. His hope is to improve the quality of life for himself and his neighbors and to protect the land for generations to come.

Just a few years ago, Luis struggled to imagine his future, now he is helping his community imagine a future of abundance. Through Luis and through your gifts to One Great Hour of Sharing, God is doing More Than We Can Imagine!
